

**GENERAL CONDITIONS FOR NATIVE ENDANGERED
AND THREATENED SPECIES PERMITS**

50 CFR 17.22 and 17.32

50 CFR 17.62 and 17.72

All sections of Title 50 *Code of Federal Regulations* Part 13 are conditions of the permit.

All applicable foreign, State, local, tribal, or other Federal laws, including those requiring a permit, must be observed.

Living specimens must be handled and shipped so as to minimize risk of injury, damage to health or cruel treatment.

The container in which authorized wildlife is shipped must be plainly marked with names and addresses of shipper and consignee and an accurate description of the contents including common and scientific name and number of each within.

Permittee must carry a copy of the permit while conducting authorized activities.

Permit or subpermit number must be legibly printed on all documents involving activities conducted under the permit.

Any dead or injured specimens of the authorized wildlife found may be salvaged or cared for.

Unless otherwise specified on the face of the permit, the wildlife must be immediately released at or near the capture site after the permitted activity.

Unexpected death, injury, or escape of the authorized wildlife shall be reported to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service before the end of the next business day.

Bird banding, marking, radio tagging, etc., must be conducted in accordance with a Federal Bird Marking and Salvage permit.

The following conditions apply until authorized disposal of the wildlife regardless of expiration date of the permit:

The authorized wildlife may NOT be sold, donated, or transferred unless the receiver has first been issued authorization by the Director.

Any dead authorized wildlife shall be preserved and held for scientific purposes whenever practical.
